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### **Narrative Report**

In my 26 years as a pediatrician and child health researcher, I have seen the pediatric landscape transformed by technology. The human genome project has provided promise of precision diagnostics and therapy. The internet has connected us instantaneously with information and insights that no one clinician could master. Big data has given us tools to analyze large global datasets, allowing us to investigate patterns of wellness and prevention, as well as disease and intervention. But it is not only clinical care for children, but the environments in which children are growing up that have been transformed by technology. Inexpensive, easy-to-use mobile devices have allowed everyone, even very young children, to be constantly connected to the world. And this connectivity has, in a very short period of time, transformed the way we live, learn, interact, and behave with each other. Because adolescents are early adopters and experimenters, I see issues presented by technology most profoundly in the patients for whom I care. Since the beginning of my medical career, I have examined the associations of the media children and adolescents use and how they use them with their physical, mental, and social health.

Coming to medicine from a career as a filmmaker and writer in an age when television was the only widely used electronic screen, I saw great potential for applying its capability of reaching many thousands, even millions, of children and families with information and strategies that could improve their health literacy, promoting wellness and preventing illness. However, I also saw that many families used television as an electronic babysitter, leading to poorer health outcomes ranging from obesity to anxiety and aggression. Seeing early on that video could be more than just a receptive medium, I saw an opportunity to engage children and families to share information about their lives, their needs, and their challenges, providing patient-centered information “from the inside out.” Understanding that electronic screens were going to be central to our future, I began to explore two lines of research – investigating the health risks of screen media use to the developing child and adolescent and the positive potential of leveraging young people’s deep engagement with media to educate, empower and build their health literacy.

Pursuing the risks presented by media use, I conducted content analyses of music videos, a form that transitioned screen media from broadcast television to the short form videos of the internet. I was a finalist for the New Investigator Award from the Society for Adolescent Health and Medicine (SAHM) for work examining the portrayals of violence and weapon-carrying in these youth media and built on that and the body of media violence research to be the lead author on the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) Media Violence policy statement. I served on the AAP Committee on Public Education and the Editorial Board of Pediatrics, authoring four AAP policy statements on media. In this role, I testified to the U.S. Congress, legislatures of Massachusetts, Illinois and North Carolina, and the Chicago City Council. I worked with district attorneys to build media literacy into crime prevention programs. In 2005, I co-authored the bipartisan Children and Media Research Advancement bill with Senators Joseph Lieberman, Hillary Clinton, and Sam Brownback, seeking dedicated Federal funding for health research on media effects. Significant as health risks from media use might be, however, it was clear, with the dawning of the internet, that screens increasingly engaged young people's attention. It was critical to use evidence not to restrict screen time, but to direct our children and ourselves to use media in mindful and focused ways that improved health and development.

Bringing together my skills as a filmmaker and as a researcher, I explored video as a tool to better understand human health and development. Seeking a patient-centric understanding of child illness, I developed an innovative research methodology, Video Intervention/Prevention Assessment (VIA), which has patients create visual illness narratives, video diaries of their own experiences of illness. Collecting audiovisual data from patients who were living with asthma, obesity, sickle cell disease, human immunodeficiency virus, cystic fibrosis and myelodysplasia, we analyzed their VIA narratives by combining video logging and qualitative analysis techniques, yielding rigorous, reproducible findings about the adolescent's experience of illness. VIA methodology has been detailed in peer-reviewed medical and scientific journals, the *Encyclopedia of Qualitative Research Methods*, and several texts on research methods. In 1998, I was awarded the SAHM New Investigator Award for using VIA to investigate pediatric asthma, a study that generated the first paper to be published with video findings in *Pediatrics*. Because VIA showed that not only clinicians, but fellow patients could learn from the lived experience of others, we have evolved this research method into secure, medically moderated social media networks dedicated to those who share a diagnosis. Using these networks, children and families living with chronic medical conditions can move beyond an isolating diagnosis to find a community of shared experience, to crowdsource medical and paramedical problem-solving, and to receive help and, more therapeutically, to *give* help to others struggling with the same condition.

In 2002, I founded the Center on Media and Child Health (CMCH), an interdisciplinary center of excellence that investigates, translates, and innovates at the interface between digital screen media and the physical, mental, and social health of children and adolescents. In pursuing a comprehensive and flexible measure of exposure to constantly evolving media that can be applied to prospective longitudinal research, I combined ecological momentary assessment, video data, recall estimates and time-use diaries to develop Measurement of Youth Media Exposure (MYME). This real-time measure of media exposure and health status can be administered annually, yielding long-term observations akin to the Framingham Heart Study. Piloted with NIH funding, MYME is now incorporated in a smartphone app and being applied to several thousand preschool-through-adolescent participants in Canada and, in a modified form, to study influence of play on cognitive and social-emotional development in Mexico and the US.

My media translation and transmission of health information has taken many forms, from a funny health education video starring Danny DeVito to teach children to manage their asthma to Ask the Mediatrixian™, an online question and answer column about healthy media use for parents, teachers, clinicians, and children. I have served as visiting professor across the United States, in Europe, Asia, and South America. I have sat on expert panels and study sections for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, National Institute of Child Health and Human Development, and National Institute of

Mental Health. I have served on advisory boards at PBS and *Parents* magazine, on the National Television Oversight Monitoring Board, and as a Senior Fellow of the Fred M. Rogers Center for Early Learning and Children's Media. I have been honored by the AAP with the Holroyd-Sherry Award for "outstanding contributions that have demonstrated that media's influence on child and adolescent health is an important public health issue" and, most recently, with the Adele Dellenbaugh Hofmann Award for excellence in Adolescent Health.

Most importantly, perhaps, I have never stopped asking questions and seeking solutions. Increasing numbers of patients who have presented to me as "The Mediatrician" with failing physical or mental health, difficulties at home or school, even suicidality, because of their uncontrolled interactive media use have led to characterizing a syndrome, Problematic Interactive Media Use (PIMU), for which I wrote the opening chapter of the new text, "Internet Addiction" in which my colleagues and I call for rigorous diagnostic criteria, treatment strategies that are constantly evaluated and improved, and the education of clinical colleagues in medicine and psychology so that a larger infrastructure of care can be established for this new syndrome of the Digital Age. To this end, we will be developing a dedicated Clinic for Interactive Media and Internet Disorders (CIMAID) at Boston Children's Hospital, where young patients and their families can be evaluated and treated, data on their presentations and courses of treatment collected, and clinical trainees can gain experience with PIMU and other media-related physical, mental, and social health conditions.
